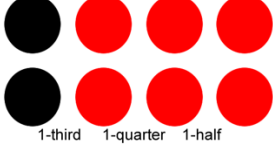

He wore a long purple robe and carried what looked like a box covered by a gold cloth. 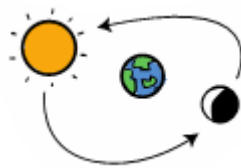

Earth's place in the Solar System

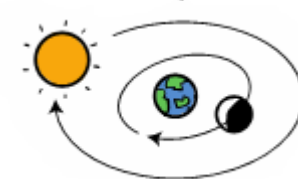
Below are some potential theories about how the planets move in relation to each other. Which theory do you think is most likely? Explain your reasoning?

Research your answer and give some evidence to support your theory.

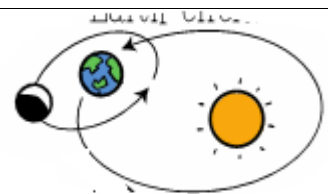
Theory 1: The Moon and the Earth both circle around the earth
